# 71 Are Indicted In "1,000,000" Alleged Lottery

Said to Be One of Largest Businesses Of Kind

PITTSBURGH (AP)—A federal grand jury Thursday indicted 71 persons on charges of violating postal laws in the operation of an eight-state lottery, which post office agents described as a "million dollar" enterprise and one of the largest of its kind in the nation.

Acting on a complaint entered by Acting U. S. Attorney George Masbank, the grand jury returned indictments charging the 71 with using the mail for furtherance of a lottery with conspiracy to violate postal regulations through distribution of materials for a lottery based chiefly on the treasury, balance and sports results.

The jury's action resulted from an 18-month investigation of the Pool Owners Association, which Postal Inspector D. H. Stephens charged was organized and headed by Louis Cohen, former Boston attorney and one of those indicted. Cohen was listed variously as a resident of Miami, Fla., Newton, Mass., Wilmington, Del., and Philadelphia.

The complaint charged the organization had its main headquarters at 901 Drexel Avenue in the exclusive Drexel Hill district of Philadelphia, and operated in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland, Ohio, New York, Massachusetts, Florida and Delaware.

## Pennsylvania Finds Removal Of Snow Costly

HARRISBURG, Pa.—Pennsylvania's Highway Secretary I. L. Lammert Hughes does some real shuddering when a heavy snowfall hits the state, and it's not from cold.

The Keystone state, a leader in the United States in the battle to keep highways and roads out of winter's grip, spends \$75,000 a day for winter service when a real snowstorm of state wide proportion occurs. Approximately 8,000 men and 1,250 trucks are sent out to keep state-maintained roads open.

Total cost of snow cleaning operations during 1939-40 found Pennsylvania leading in expenditures with \$1,379,730. New York spent \$2,771,232 for second place, and other states in the order of expenditures included Massachusetts, \$1,276,623; Michigan, \$1,251,023; Ohio, \$1,183,861; and Wisconsin, \$879,287.

Pennsylvania kept 18,215 miles of highways free of snow, to become the leading state in this department. Ohio was second with 16,675; Missouri, third, 15,582; and New York, fourth, 11,831.
